Marathon, half marathon reach caps in unprecedented 3 weeks



With Brookings Marathon face coverings and their favorite sports jerseys, the SDSU softball team was among the aid and traffic volunteers for the 2020 marathon Sept. 12.

Monthly group run kicks off April 5 at Wooden Legs

Basketball may be on tap later Monday night, April 5, at Wooden Legs Brewing Co., 309 Fifth St., downtown Brookings, but at 5:30 p.m. Prairie Striders is serving up its first group run.

The monthly runs of about three miles will begin and end at Wooden Legs, which also is offering \$1 off specials to participants. There also will be a one-mile route for walkers and those wanting a short run. Prairie Striders will have pace leaders, but the runs are open to nonmembers and club members.

The effort is being organized by Andy Carlson, director of the Oakwood Lakes Trail Run. He called the group runs, to be held on the first Monday April through September, "an excellent opportunity to bond with other runners while still getting a workout in."

After each run, there will be a drawing for a \$20 gift certificate from 605 Running Co., Sioux Falls.

In addition, after the April 5 run, Prairie Striders will present its Friend of Running Awards from 2019 and 2020 as well as 2020 participant awards.

Registration for the 52nd annual Brookings Marathon is off to a strong start, race director Matt Bien reports.

"With big races still tentative, not many spring events are scheduled. Interest in our event has been high with fewer than 50% of spots remaining just two weeks after registration opened. With Fargo (Marathon) moving to/staying with the fall, we have increased

numbers from the Fargo-Moorhead area," Bien said.

With three weeks of opening 2021 registration, the marathon and half marathon caps were hit, Bien said.

He adds that "many of the same safety procedures implemented last fall will likely to be in place" for this year's May 15 race.

The postponed Sept. 12 race was capped at 150 in the full marathon, 210

Marathon: COVID-19 protocols expected again

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in the half and 20 relay teams to allow for social distancing at the start and there were three wave starts. This year's caps are 200 in the marathon, 300 in the half and 50 relay teams. Normal caps are 300 in the full, 400 in the half and 50 teams.

COVID-19 cases in Brookings and South Dakota have been steadily dropping in recent weeks, however, "even if we're in a good place in regard to COVID, change in USATF protocols will lag. We will plan for distancing, masks and temp checks. With any luck, we can back off on some of those measures," Bien said.

USA Track and Field sanctions the event and provide insurance coverage, as it does for all Prairie Striders races, so the races need to follow USATF guidelines.

Runners who had registered for the May 2020 event were given the opportu-

nity to forward their registration to 2021. So far, 75% of those who deferred have activated their registration.

Runners who participated in September will see a familiar course. A change that incorporated Dakota Nature Park into the 26.2-mile route will be retained.

Other Prairie Striders races for 2021 are also still scheduled. For details, go to prairiestriders.net and clip out the schedule on P. 1 of the newsletter.

Knaus follows trail of alums to SDSU

Wikipedia's list of notable alums for St. Michael-Albertville (Minn.) High School doesn't include Rachel King, Chase Cayo or Brendan Sage, but they've made a pretty good impact at South Dakota State University and the next St. Michael-Albertville alum is starting his own story at State.

Carter Knaus, a sophomore miler and recipient of the 2020-21 Prairie Striders/Phil LaVallee Memorial Scholarship, got the 2021 indoor season off to a strong start by finishing third in the mile at the Jim Emmerich Invitational at SDSU Jan. 23 with a PR time of 4:14:80. That's more than two seconds better than his old mark (4:17:00) set at the Summit League Championships in 2020.

King, a 2015 graduate of St. Michael-Albertville and a 2019 graduate of SDSU, laid claim to six school records in track and cross country for the Knights and also captained the hockey team.

She left hockey in Minnesota when she ran at state, but continued to grab school records as well as qualify for two national meets.

King graduated from State as a six-time school record holder. Her outdoor marks: 5K (16:09.54 in 2018), 3K steeplechase (9:50.15 in 2019) and distance medley relay (anchor leg in 2018). Her indoor marks: mile (4:48.94 in 2018), 3K (9:26.23 in 2019) and 5K 16:29.88 in 2018). She also is second in the outdoor 1,500 meters (4:25.12 in 2019).

Cayo, an unattached competitor for 2020-21 indoor season, has a year of outdoor eligibility left and is the unofficial grandpa for this year's Jackrabbit team.

He graduated from St. Michael-Albertville when Knaus was an eighth-grader. A two-time all-state cross country athlete at St. Michael-Albertville, Cayo has been a consistent scorer for the Jackrabbits in cross country and track.

Cayo holds the titles of 2017 Summit League cross country champion, 2018 indoor track and field champion in the 5,000 and outdoor champion in the 10,000. He carries five team titles under his belt (four in cross country, one in indoor track and field) and marked a fourth-place finish in the 2019 Summit League Cross Country Championships to push his team to a perfect score of 15 and secure the fourth consecutive conference title for the Jacks.

Sage, a 2013 graduate of St. Michael-Albertville and a two-time Class AA all-state performer there, graduated from SDSU in 2017.

In his Jackrabbit days Sage was first-team All-Summit League in cross country 2014, when he was twice named athlete of the week; clocked a 4:10:98 indoor mile in 2017 as well as outdoor bests of 3:54.25 (1,500 meters) and 14:36.68 (5,000 meters) in 2017. Since graduation, he has turned to the marathon winning two events — Arizona and Brookings in 2020.

In the St. Michael-Albertville Gym, Cayo, Knaus and Sage are listed one-two-three for their cross country 5K times — 15:32, 15:35 and 15:36, respectively.

DeHaven's honest recruiting pitch

While Knaus was certainly familiar with Cayo and Sage, it was another runner with an impressive pedigree that caused him to choose SDSU. "Rod (DeHaven) was pretty cool," Knaus said of the Yellow and Blue head coach and former Olympic marathoner, who set seven school records during his SDSU days.

"He was straight forward and put stuff more honest than some coaches ... Rod was honest in everything he was saying" and didn't overstate the team's potential. "Also, it was pretty cool how he ran back in the day," Knaus said.

He said he hasn't regretted his decision to become a Jackrabbit, even though it was "a weird jump" to leave the shadow of the Twin Cities to live on the rural Dakota plains.

"It's been a good transition. I like the school and the running program. There are a lot of good people," Knaus said.

He has adjusted to not being able to go to Target or other major stores and has learned to hunt. His roommates have taken him pheasant and duck hunting and he plans to go again next fall.

Goals — short and long term

His indoor track goal is to bring his mile time into the 4:10-11 range and be named all-conference. As a freshman, he ran the 1200-meter leg on the second place distance medley relay team at the Summit League Championships.

He expects to run the 1,500 and 800 meters in the outdoor season, but it will be new experience for him at the college level because COVID-19 canceled the 2020 season.

In the classroom, Knaus is in his first semester as a nursing student. He choose the field after watching his parents (Zach and Lisa) spend their days behind a desk as information technologists. "I like to be up talking to people. I saw health care as a good option. There are a lot of different fields you can go into and you can work anywhere you want."

However, he found there aren't a lot of schools where you can pursue nursing and run at the collegiate level. SDSU is an exception. In fact, nursing faculty member and Strider Becka Foerester still holds a school record.

Knaus is the fifth person to receive the Prairie Striders/Phil LaVallee Memorial Scholarship (see accompanying list). The scholarship became endowed from 2019 donations to the club and will soon provide \$3,000/year.

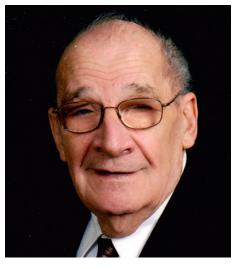

Bob Bartling shares the following memories:

"Our club is mostly composed of runners and

people interested in running. However, back in the '80s and '90s we had a member who seldom ran a step. He was a walker and a serious one. He walked year around regardless of the weather.

"Most walkers do their thing on our sidewalks, not Jerry Bergum. He was a street-only guy, facing traffic with every step. His route was clockwise from his house on 11th St. It usually covered Medary Avenue, Seventh Street, Western Avenue, Eighth Street, and back home (close to 3 miles).

"Those of you who jogged back in those days in that part of Brookings would have seen Jerry. He was hard to miss. Strong stride but with a pronounced lean to the side. His friends said they called him a moving Tower of Pisa.

"When the club category of Life Member became available, Jerry was one of our first members to sign up. Each year when membership time came around he always renewed his commitment to the club with a gift."

• Rick Holm, a life member of Prairie Striders and architect of the current Brookings Marathon course, died March 22, 2020, after a battle with pancreatic cancer.

Matt Bien, marathon race director, said, "Runners, especially those with connections to Brookings, appre-



ciate how the course highlights every corner of town. Rick's hand in course design is just one of many ways he touched this community."

Harvey was a quiet member who created a huge impact. Although he never served on the board, he was always available for any special needs. One time that came to mind was his will-

He loved to run, mostly alone, but on occasion, he would drive to town and run with our club running group. Harv could run; he was a fac-

tor in every race that offered age group competition. In later years, when knee problems surfaced, he switched to a bicycle. In no time at all, he was one of the top master bike racers in our country.

One of his favorite subjects was the Boston Marathon. In 1976, Harv was one of our group who ran the Boston Marathon. The Boston Marathon has been around forever, but 1976 turned out to be the hottest day in the history of the event. It was 92 degrees at gun time. The medical people (George Sheehan) tried to convince the race committee to postpone the race. No luck. Our only salvation was the garden hoses stretched across lawns because in those days they did not provide any aid stations on the course. Incidentally, Harvey was our club's first finisher.

We will miss Harv. He was a friend, runner, racer, worker, a major contributor and a good guy.

• Alison Tappan, part of the Turtles Rock (running) group, died Nov. 16, 2020, after a long battle with cancer.

Fellow group members Peg Whalen and Colene Reiser shared some thoughts on Tappan.

"If you were ever driving past Hillcrest School at 6 a.m., you might



have spotted several ladies of a certain age and a large black dog heading out for a 3-mile run — this was the Turtles Running Group. Alison was our pacer. She was our rock, our steady one. Her favorite running shirt stated: 'Race Day Strategy: Start slow, then back off.'

"The Turtles discussed everything while running and often solved the world's problems! Alison glowed when she spoke of her family (husband, Gray and children Taylor, Erin and Bryce). They were her center.

"She was ever strong and courageous and we miss our friend."

Michigan runner sets hs mile mark

There is a new force to be reckoned with in high school track. Hobbs Kessler, who competes for Skyline High School in Ann Arbor, Michigan, broke the national indoor high school record in the mile, running 3:57.66 at the American Track League meet in Fayetteville, Arkansas on February 7.

The 17-year-old didn't start running until his freshman year in high school, but he's no stranger to the sport—both of his parents, who are successful runners themselves, coach Skyline's track and field and cross-country teams. Previously, Kessler focused more on rock climbing than he did running, and he even climbed at the 2019 Youth World Climbing Championship in Italy.

But his parents convinced him to give cross country a try, saying that he didn't have to do it again if he didn't like it.

That bond on my cross-country team, it sucked me in almost," Kessler told Runner's World. "It tricked me. I made buddies on the team, and it was awesome. I've just gone from there."

His running trajectory has peaked quicker than most since his freshman campaign. When he started, he boasted a mile time just below five minutes.
